### I. <u>Legislative Update</u>

<u>Session Overview</u>. The legislative session has nearly ground to a halt as lawmakers try to negotiate a state budget that can pass the House and Senate. Legislators spent a total of five hours in <u>floor sessions</u> this week, with much of that devoted to speeches honoring specific causes or constituents visiting the Capitol. There was some progress on bills as House members advanced proposals to allow schools to use <u>vans to transport students</u>, broaden parents' ability to <u>review school library books</u> and sue teachers under the state's <u>parental rights</u> laws, criminalize <u>hazing</u>, and outline a chain of command for <u>National Guard volunteers</u>. Senators approved bills to expand property tax exemptions for <u>affordable housing units</u>, expand the use of money from the <u>Water Infrastructure Finance Authority</u>, and study new options for retirement savings programs.

Legislators failed to pass changes to the oversight of <u>state agency rulemaking</u>, the <u>self-insurance</u> standards for state agencies, the amount of value a property owner can keep <u>before paying creditors</u>, and regulations on tobacco products.

<u>Next Week</u>. The weeks ahead will bring much of the same slow progress until legislative leaders are ready to move forward with a budget. There are almost 300 bills that are still eligible for votes, though many of those are on hold because they relate to state budget decisions.

<u>Governor Ducey Highlights</u>. Governor Ducey signed 34 new laws this week. He has signed a total of <u>197</u> bills this year and has not vetoed any.

New COVID-19 Laws. COVID-19 shaped much of the early part of the 2022 legislative session, as lawmakers repealed virus mitigation measures for Capitol buildings and introduced dozens of bills to direct Arizona's response to the pandemic and future public health emergencies. While most of the proposals related to COVID-19 were sidelined, some continue to advance and several have been signed into law.

Limits on face mask mandates.

Governor Ducey enacted a law that prohibits governments and schools from requiring anyone under the age of 18 to <u>wear a face mask</u> unless they have received express parental consent. Another bill the legislature is considering would ban any governmental entity from requiring face masks on <u>governmentowned property</u> (with limited exceptions).

## Bans on COVID-19 vaccine mandates.

Governor Ducey enacted a ban on any government entity mandate for a <u>COVID-19 vaccine</u> (except for health care institutions owned or operated by a government entity). Lawmakers continue to advance proposals to ban schools from requiring COVID-19 vaccines for <u>classroom attendance</u>, prohibit any governmental entity from requiring a COVID-19 vaccine for someone <u>under the age of 18</u> without parental consent, and limit <u>private employers</u>' ability to require a COVID-19 vaccination for an employee who claims a religious exemption.

# Reducing executive authority during emergencies.

Governor Ducey has enacted laws to ensure <u>religious entities</u> remain open during an emergency and to prohibit <u>local government officials</u> from requiring business closures during a state of emergency. Another bill awaiting his signature would place strict limits on how long a Governor could issue a <u>state of emergency</u> without legislative involvement and authority to extend the emergency. The House is considering a proposal to ban the state and its contractors from going door-to-door to <u>ask about a person's vaccination status</u>.

The new laws will go into effect 90 days after the end of the legislative session.

These bills have advanced almost entirely on party lines, with Republicans supporting and Democrats opposing. This partisan divide will shape future discussions on public health policies, as well.

<u>Election Updates</u>. <u>Steve Gaynor</u> suspended his campaign to be the next Arizona Governor. Through legislative referrals and citizen initiatives, lawmakers and advocacy groups want to ask voters to shape <u>the future of elections in Arizona</u>. Voters know <u>what issues matter</u> to them.

<u>Court Updates</u>. A Maricopa County Superior Court ruled that officials who participated in events on <u>January 6</u> can run for re-election, but the issue <u>is not going away</u>. Two Arizona politicians asked a court to ban the use of <u>vote-counting machines</u>. The U.S. Supreme Court opted not to consider a prior court ruling that allows Arizona defense attorneys to challenge a state law that bans <u>contact with crime victims</u>. Arizona political leaders have differing opinions about how a future U.S. Supreme Court ruling could impact <u>Arizona abortion laws</u>. A Maricopa County Superior Court judge held the <u>former Cyber Ninjas CEO</u> personally liable for providing records on the Senate's ballot recount.

<u>News Updates</u>. Half a million <u>AHCCCS members</u> must verify their eligibility when the federal COVID-19 emergency declaration ends. The <u>U.S. Census Bureau</u> delayed its release of demographic data. The state continues its efforts to <u>hire veterans</u>.
